Sunday Reflection from Fr. Pius Duke

The story of the Emmaus disciples shows how God works in our lives. These two disciples, leaving Jerusalem and walking back to Emmaus, symbolize humans in their hopeless, discouraged and disillusioned state. The one whom they had followed for three years, hoping for better times under his leadership, is no more. All the talk about his rising from the dead on the third day has only been a myth. Now there is no more reason to stay on in Jerusalem. In their hopelessness they are returning to their obscure village. But the Lord is not ready to leave them in their hopeless condition. The Lord leads them through the scripture, through breaking of bread, opens their eyes, and brings them back their hope and joy. Our Lord is, therefore, a living God. He is alive and active in our lives.

Since it was impossible for Christ to be held captive by death, so it is equally impossible for us, whom Christ has ransomed with his precious blood to remain captives. This is because, we share in Christ's new life. It was while celebrating the liturgy of his own body and blood (the Eucharist) with the disciples "that their eyes opened, and they recognised him". Therefore, the celebration of the Eucharist with his disciples, underscores the importance of Christ's injunction: "Do this in memory of me." Indeed, he has ransomed and given us new life through his paschal mystery. Yet, in order to sustain and nourish this new life, He left us himself in these two important liturgies of the Holy Mass (Word and Eucharist). Christ did this today to remind us that each time we celebrate these liturgies worthily, He opens our eyes, in order to recognize his divine presence with us. Through the breaking of bread in memory of Him, He nourishes our life, and makes it new every day.
