Here is a prayer, **an Act of Spiritual Communion**, which you can say as you watch the Mass at home:

"My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You."

Prayer at the end of Mass:

Hail, holy Queen, Mother of mercy, hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve: to thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus, O merciful, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary! *Pray for us, O holy Mother of God*, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Amen.

The Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity began last Monday and ends tomorrow, the feast of the Conversion of St Paul. This year the theme is based on *John 15:1-17: Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit.*

Feast of the Presentation (Candlemas), 2nd February. This will be a week on Tuesday.

Lent. Three weeks on Wednesday will be the start of Lent. It's not too early to start thinking what you can do to make this season of grace fruitful.

Ashes for Ash Wednesday (17th February). Do you know where the ashes come from for Ash Wednesday? They are made by burning the palms that we waved on Palm Sunday to welcome the Lord into His City. Of course, last Palm Sunday we were under lockdown and the church was closed, so we didn't have any palms. Nevertheless, I am hoping that we can make our own ashes for Ash Wednesday. If you have palms from earlier Palm Sundays that we could use for this, please bring them to church over the next few weeks.

Sunday of the Word of God. Pope Francis has decreed that the third Sunday of Ordinary Time should be the Sunday of the Word of God. "Devoting a specific Sunday of the liturgical year to the word of God can enable the Church to experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world." (Pope Francis). So, ...

3 ***Echoes of God: Journeying with the word of God.*** Today we begin a journey through the whole Bible in a 7-week course written by David McLoughlin. These weekly reflections are perfect for us to read through and chew over at home during this period of lockdown. Each week takes a fundamental core teaching of Scripture and together the sessions help us get a sense of the Scriptures as a whole; to see the unfolding of God's liberating and creative love in the history of Israel and in the Church. Today, week one, we start with Exodus. The Government has asked us not to celebrate baptisms and weddings until further notice. I am sorry if this causes some disruption. I shall keep you up to date with any other changes required. We all know that there will be a few more difficult months ahead and it is important that we are sensible, and we do our best to protect each other. We are very fortunate to have the opportunity to come to Mass and to be able to celebrate the Sacraments, even with some restrictions. Please continue to be sensible and to make wise decisions concerning you and your family. For your protection and that of everyone else, when you come to Sacred Heart, please remember to wear a face-covering, to sanitise your hands on arrival and departure, to check in for the track and trace, and to keep your distance from others who are not in your "bubble. Holocaust Memorial Day is held on 27th January each year, marking the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp. It's a time for everyone to pause to remember the millions of people who have been murdered or whose lives have been changed during the Holocaust, and in subsequent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. The theme of this year's HMD is 'Be the light in the darkness'.

Next Sunday is Racial Justice Sunday. This year Racial Justice Sunday (31 January) is more important than ever. The effects of the pandemic, the killing of George Floyd, and the powerful message on fraternity and equality by Pope Francis in *Fratelli Tutti* speak of the need to actively oppose racism and pursue racial justice with renewed vigour. We are all children of God. The Bishops' Conference has commissioned a series of videos to share the thoughts of Black Catholics about the events of the past year, how we can build a better society and the important role that our Church can play.
