Welcome to Sacred Heart Church, especially if you are visiting our parish for the Christmas holiday.

If you are here with us for the first time today, welcome. If you are returning to Mass after a period of time away because of the pandemic, welcome back! It is lovely to see you again today.

Christmastide ends this evening. From tomorrow we return to “Ordinary Time” in the Church’s Year. Sunday Mass readings are taken from Cycle C, and Weekday readings are from Year 2. **Next Sunday** is the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time. It is also designated as **Peace Sunday**, a day to pray for world peace.

I am planning to take a few days off this week, so there will be no public Mass here on Tuesday or Friday. I shall still be celebrating Mass, however, and I shall offer Mass for the intentions listed above.

Here is a prayer, **an Act of Spiritual Communion**, which you can say as you watch a Livestream Mass:

Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You.”
